#### MIDNIGHT SWING

### MUSIC

There are 41+ spots in the script where we can use music. This doesn't mean we need 41 swing arrangements. We can use incidentals or theme music repeatedly.

The songs in this document are largely public domain.

Here's a quick breakdown:

BG = background

OS = off screen

Blue highlighting = songs to be played by the fictional Teddy Arnold and his Blue Boys Dance Band.

Yellow highlighting = songs that are played by other fictional Big Bands in the story.

Green highlighting = incidental music

# 1. Intro/opening scene, pp. 1-6

- 4. Kids make out at the sidelines, then hit the dance floor when the music kicks it up a notch. Throughout this scene we have a dance number where the kids get crazy and a fight breaks out. pp. 8-12

- 9. Rehearsal w Teddy's band. This is just the tail end of a song. Teddy ends the number. A few musicians continue to jam as the band winds down. It should sound a little messy at this point. pp. 35-35 This scene has been cut.

- 10. Need a few scales or simple lines played on a solo trumpet. This takes place O.S. p. 37, before Mary beans Jack w her ash tray.
- 11. A rag quartet plays O.S. while Teddy invites Larry to hit the road w his band. There are festival games and merriment going on in the BG. p. 38
